WELCOME TO MARCH - TO THE MONTH THAT IS FULL-ON LENT.

We are exploring the theme of Decolonization and identifying our privilege in our worship. **I'm reminded about a** teaching from Richard Wagamese in his book, <u>Embers</u>. He said in one of his dialogues:

"Me (Richard): You always repeat things three times.

Old Woman: Just the important things. Me: Why? I hear you the first time.

Old Woman: No. You listen the first time. You hear the second time. And you feel the third time.

Me: I don't get it.

Old Woman: When you listen, you become aware. **That's for your head.** When you hear, you awaken. **That's for your heart.** When you feel, it becomes a part of you. **That's for your spirit.** Three times. **It's so you learn to listen with your whole being. That's how you learn."** (pg. 113)

In our explorations of decolonization and privilege we are going to hear people speak to us about their experience of being colonized and how they experience white privilege and its impact on their lives. Our goal in this is not to make ourselves feel guilty, or needing to justify ourselves, or to move us to anger. It is so we can learn to listen with our whole being. That is how we will learn.

As our spirits open to the stories of others we will be changed, transformed. This is the blessing and the work of Lent. We start at the place of knowing we all have work to do and have fallen short of being the people we want to be and creating the world we want to create. Being progressive Christians means we do not agree that human beings are created as sinful and that we spend our days trying to control our depravity. No, indeed, we believe that human beings are created as good, as blessed and we spend our days trying to contribute our light, our uniqueness to the world. When our goodness is wounded we seek healing and the restoration of safety. And as we believe for ourselves so we believe for all other human beings. So it is that we seek to uproot all attitudes, actions, policies and laws and unconscious cultural norms that wound another, that judge those who are unlike us or leave others feeling unsafe. This is the opening of our eyes, minds, hearts and spirits we seek this Lenten tide.

Another big event in these March days is the presentation of the proposed design for renovating our Cedar Hill Cross site to be our permanent home. What a step towards amalgamation this will be. When we came together we said we wanted to establish a new home for all of us to grow into together. We believe the scope of this proposal accomplishes this. We asked for a design that would let in both natural light and view of the world outside. We wanted flexibility so that spaces could become what it needed to be in different circumstances. We wanted space for community to gather in a variety of ways. We want music to fill the space at times. At other times we want to walk in meditative silence. And we want a space that will be equipped for the next 20 years. For the most important thing we want is a vital faith community welcoming community into a beautiful, functional and safe space for many, many years to come. It is to that vision of a hopeful future that we gave assent at amalgamation.

Enjoy the newsletter. Take an active part in launching BVU into a new home that we will build together. A new home for our community this is:

- blessed by the generous spirit of those who have gone before
- engaged by the challenges the world is facing
- confident that the Spirit's energy will propel us into the future

We are excited to be able to provide for the congregation an opportunity to watch the newest production by the Belfry theatre here in Victoria online! In the past we sold tickets for a live performance and then followed it up with debrief session in person. This year we will be able to offer you a chance to view the film online during a window of time each day (11 am – 8 pm start) and you will be sent a link to watch. The performances were done live here in Victoria and then will show March 16 – 21st. BUILDING REDESIGN PROPOSAL AND THE TOWN HALL MEETING MARCH 9TH

It is with excitement that the Building Redesign Working group provides you with this second package of materials related to the initial proposal that the congregation received in November. Response to those presentations was positive and so you will not see huge changes to the initial designs. There were a number of suggestions made, questions asked and concerns raised in a few areas and the committee has sought to integrate some changes in as a result of the feedback and address some of the other ongoing issues that we are still working to resolve in this second package.



While most of the floor plans will look familiar, there are some changes to the lower hall area now known as the hub and in the chancel area to incorporate some of the new changes. Other changes suggested by the congregation will be worked into the next level of drawings (called elevations) that the architect will work on once the project and the budget has been approved by the congregation.

A virtual video that walks you through the new sanctuary is also a part of the package and we hope it will communicate the energy and feel of the new design especially for those who find floor plans hard to imagine in 3 D. The remainder of the package outlines the budget, the history of the project, the issues still being worked out and what is being considered and a reminder of the values and principles that we are working from in the design. There will still be a number of decision that will need to be made regarding some of the outstanding issues and further input is welcomed from the congregation as we proceed.

It's not you.


It's everyone.

A huge thank you to all the walkers and supporters of BVU's team, Walk the Talk.



March's Education and Action: Focus on Transition Housing for Women in Need

We know that rents are very high and vacancy rates very low in our city. This can be a huge barrier for women trying to escape abusive relationships or addiction as they need safe and secure housing to make this transition. Anawim House, in North Park, has long provided transition housing and counselling services to single men and for many years, they have wanted to provide similar services for women in a separate facility.

Anawim House, like BVU, is a member of GVAT and supports GVAT's collective efforts to improve housing options and affordability in Victoria. Through the generosity of an anonymous donor, they have received a suitable property that can be redeveloped to



provide 7 transitional housing units for single women. After an 11 month review process with the City and having reached an agreement outlining operating principles that most of the neighbours accept, a proposed re-zoning to allow this development will be considered by Victoria City Council Committee of the Whole on March 11. Broad View members who know Anawim House, as well as all who support transition housing for women in need, are urged to write brief emails of support to mayorandcouncil@victoria.ca prior to March 10, referring to Anawim House application for re-zoning on Edgeware Road.

Points you might include in your letter of support:

- mention you are a member of Broad View United, a faith community actively working to end poverty and homelessness in the CRD
- * stress the Importance of providing affordable community housing for women in transition
- supportive housing reduces other community costs (police, health care)
- * enables women to regain self-confidence, independence, and contribute to the greater community
- * Anawim House has a long and successful track record in North Park community




TUESDAYS FOR TREES - EVENT SUMMARY AND NEXT STEPS

SAVE BC'S ANCIENT FORESTS

On February 9, an on-line zoom event was held for BVU and other community members.

Approximately 35 people participated in the event which was sponsored by BVU's Environment and Climate Justice Small Group and BVU's Greater Victoria Acting Together (GVAT) team. The purpose of the event was to explore issues related to old growth logging in BC with a view to considering whether the church should take action and, if so, which actions. We invited Jane Welton from GVAT's Climate Action Research Team to speak about their Tuesdays for Trees campaign. We also invited Jens Wieting, the Senior Forest Campaigner from Sierra Club of B.C. to share a slide presentation that can be found here.

During the event, we learned that the provincial government commissioned an expert panel to prepare recommendations on old growth logging, the "Old Growth Strategic Review". The panel submitted 14 recommendations in 2020, and the NDP campaigned last fall on a promise to implement all of them. A temporary "logging deferral" was introduced in some areas, but very little of that area turns out to be threatened old growth, and even there, logging roads continue to be built.

During the BVU zoom event and small group discussion, participants suggested a number of follow-up actions that BVU could undertake in order to convey to the province our community's concerns about failure of stewardship and the legacy value of these rapidly-disappearing ecosystems. In general, participants agreed that interventions from the congregation / church community as a whole would likely have the most impact, especially when combined with individual letters and actions. As a starting point, two easy and immediate actions that members of the congregation can take are:

Add your name to the Sierra Club and Wilderness Committee's petitions requesting that the provincial government fully fund and implement all recommendations from the Old Growth Strategic Review: https://sierraclub.bc.ca/tell-forest-minister-katrine-conroy-to-protect-old-growth-now/ and https://www.wildernesscommittee.org/SaveOldGrowth
