This past week the Government unveiled its 4 step plan to gradually remove the health orders and restrictions as we move toward the fall. While possible dates were given in the timeline, more importantly was the health markers of new cases and rates of vaccinations that will determine what kind of contact we will be allowed to have with one another. In the days and weeks to come you will be hearing and reading a lot in the news about what is allowed and what the various interpretations of that are going to be from different interest groups and individuals. We too as a congregation will be looking to find our path forward to the fall with both the health guidelines and other factors needing to be considered in our plan for what activities and contact will resume and when. There are some things we know now and can share with you. There are other things that are still emerging and we are waiting for the guidelines to be released for us to be able to plan. You can see our plan for this summer in the section below.

However, first and foremost we must remember that we are a diverse community of people with diverse needs and comfort levels as we emerge from this pandemic. Some of us will be eager to meet with whomever and whenever we can, and are permitted by the guidelines. Others of us may be more cautious and reticent to return to socialization right away. Some of us will be eager to ditch mask wearing, to see the faces of others, to shake hands or embrace folks we miss, while others of us will not be ready to have that close contact quite yet. Some have even said they are not sure they will ever return to shaking hands again. What we do know, is that we will need to exercise patience, kindness, compassion and gentleness with one another as we respect the different places we might each be at individually as we return to the public sphere. Some are still worried and traumatized by the past 15 months and it will take time for the anxiety and fear to retreat.

On the other side of the pandemic is a new normal. We have an opportunity to take stock of the things that we know were not working in our society, and in our way of being together as human community prior to the start of the pandemic. We have an opportunity to address some of the deep systemic roots of racism and economic **inequality, as we move into our "new normal" and address these as we rebuild our society and our world. We** have the opportunity to realize our interconnectedness as human beings across the various ideologies and systemic constructs that divide us, and work toward a new vision of a more just and equitable society. And we have the chance to do so in a way that also honours our Interconnections with the earth and its precious ecosystems. While the earth has experienced some reprieve from our impact as human beings during this pandemic, with a reduction in our use of fossil fuels, it has also been impacted negatively with the increase in a wide variety of disposable products that have been consumed and used during this same period of time. We

are at some important crossroads as individuals, as communities, as nations and as the world. As we move through the next few years of responding to the inequities of the pandemic as witnessed by the roll out of the vaccines around the world, there will be some hard questions for us to address. The advice of Paul in his letter to the Colossians will be timely still. We will need to clothe ourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience.

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




Intercultural Ministry

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What's Happening

CONGREGATIONAL MEETING - JUNE 13TH AT 11:30 AM

A congregational meeting has been called for the purpose of extending Calls to our existing Order of Ministry staff on Sunday June 13th at 11:30am via Zoom. A link for the meeting will be sent out closer to the time. You will remember that at the time of amalgamation, all existing calls for our ministers had to be ended by the rules around amalgamation. They were appointed to the new congregation of BVU for one year and these appointments end on June 30th. At the meeting, new terms of Call will be shared with the congregation and a vote held as required by the United Church of Canada. Additional information will be in the Friday email on June 4th and June 11th.

COVID 19 UPDATES FOR BVU

Return to in person meetings. Tentatively, we will have the option of returning to some in-person meetings after the 15th of June while practicing social distancing measures. There will still be a wide use of zoom to allow full participation of our community for those not quite ready to return to such activities.

In Person Worship will not resume until September 12th (if the timeline continues to unfold as stated) when groups larger than 50 can congregate in one place and participation in activities like singing are allowed once again. The board decided, based on a poll at the congregational meeting in April, that we would not resume worship until the fall when the majority of folks have been vaccinated and a critical mass can assemble. In addition, this makes room for staff holidays and fall planning to happen without this major pivot in work and detail in cleaning and distancing protocols that would be needed to host worship during the summer transition time.

Midweek regular community coffee times will resume in July and August as an opportunity for folks to come and visit with one another, meet new and familiar faces and share updates about what is happening around BVU. Days and times of these will be published in the Summer newsletter at the beginning of July.






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Calls to the Church: Listening to the Wisdom of the Elders in National Indigenous History Month

June is National Indigenous History Month

National Indigenous History month will focus our attention to deepen our commitments and actions towards justice and reconciliation within the United Church of Canada, and within our communities.

Four evenings, listening together

This four-session series will highlight the Calls to the Church (pdf) approved at the 2018 General Council. The Calls to the Church document articulates the Indigenous Church's vision for the ongoing development of Indigenous Peoples' mission and ministry and communities of faith within The United Church of Canada. It outlines pathways for the whole church to continue to walk in the Spirit of Christ toward justice, healing, and reconciliation.

Session Themes

Each session will include teaching from our Indigenous Ministers, and a time for discussion in groups.

June 1 - UCC Indigenous Church Orientation, Reconciliation Programming Sharing Circle

- an overview of UCC Indigenous Church and where we can share our work as UC Communities of \Rightarrow Faith
- June 2 Apology, TRC, UNDRIP, Calls to Church
- A review of our work as a church with the recent calls to the church by the Indigenous Elders and \Rightarrow discussion of implementation and the calls in communities of faith what they are discerning and what actions each are taking
- June 3 Meaningful Observation and Advocacy (Red Dress Day, Indigenous Month, Treaty Day, Orange Shirt Day Sisters in Spirit Day)
- Implementation of the work incorporating what has been learned from the Apology, TRC, UNDRIP and \Rightarrow the United Church Elders Calls to the Church

BUILDING REIMAGINE AND RENOVATION UPDATE

Plans and drawings are still being created and meetings held to work out the various details of the building redesign; as we move closer to having the official architectural drawings with inputs from the various engineers and other professionals. Once these drawings are complete, they then go to Saanich for approval and for building permits to be obtained. There are lots of details to be decided and ironed out as we go and various different groups of people within BVU are being




consulted with regarding specific areas and uses. Feedback or questions can still be sent to the committee at <u>reno@broadviewunited.com</u> and will be answered as is possible. We will continue to update you as the project unfolds.

As part of an evolving process, the board has nominated Doug Koch to be our Congregational Liaison with the contractor, the architect and the rest of the design team. Marilyn Poutanen will step into the professional role of Interior Designer with the rest of the architectural team and no longer be a part of the building redesign working group but rather a consultant to it. This allows us to have clarity as to which hat she is wearing in the project. Mike Emme, Faye Schmidt, Doug Kock and Sarah Schoeck will continue to serve as the building reimagine working group as the project unfolds.

When the project moves into its building phase, there will be biweekly updates from the contractor sent to Doug Koch as our congregational liaison so that there is a clear point person for the various professionals to interface with. Doug will also meet biweekly with our treasurer Paul Malnarich and the two co-lead ministers to oversee the project, the budget and keep the board updated as necessary. We are grateful to Doug for his willingness to serve in this way.

TOWN HALL JUNE 15TH @ 7:00 PM

This month's Town Hall will continue the discussion on Broad View Justice activities that was introduced at the AGM. If you didn't attend the AGM, don't worry all will be explained. Since the AGM the Justice Team has received a number of inquiries from folks who would like to learn more about the justice initiatives our church is involved in. The Town Hall will feature a short presentation and then some small group discussion opportunities so that participants can choose a couple of different initiatives that may interest them and hear more about each from a member of the congregation who is already highly involved and knowledgeable. As we merge



our communities, we want to discover each other's talents and passions, and find ways to join together in the work and life of the church.
