# Minister's Message

#### The Invitation of Advent

Advent is a time of waiting and preparing, a time of hope and joy. We can often forget the gifts of this season when the culture around us seems loud and bright. This Advent we will focus on Mary's song of praise and prophecy often called the Magnificat. It's a radical piece of poetry and reminds those listening that God is present especially to the poor and vulnerable. That they have not been forgotten and the vision of God for wholeness and shalom is embedded in the hope of this child that will be born. These words of Mary become foundational words for the life and ministry of Jesus. There can be no doubt about this mother's influence in shaping her child's values.

It is important for us to remember the context in which the birth story of Jesus is told. The story speaks of persecuted people, of a child born in poverty, of community coming together to marvel at the simple miracle of a child born into

the midst of such circumstances. The story is of visions, dreams and visits from angels. Words like "do not be afraid" and "I bring you tidings of great joy" and "your mercy reaches from age to age" are just some of the phrases of hope and promise.

The stories of Jesus birth are completely different in Matthew and Luke in detail, timing and setting. What is the consistent theme is the context of struggle, violence, poverty and despair. We too know these feelings as we come to the close of 2023. Many of us are disheartened by the wars and violence around the world. Many of us despair at the rise in foodbank usage, homelessness and lack of affordable housing. Many of us feel overwhelmed by the environmental, political and economic challenges of our day. Finding Hope in the midst of all this is not an easy thing.

Yet the stories and messages of the season of Advent are a reminder that all around us are simple signs of the presence of God. We are not alone. Others are making this journey with us. The darkness cannot overcome the light. We too can hear the voice of the angel that says, "Do not be afraid". We too can proclaim the goodness of God and know that God has not forgotten the downtrodden and the marginalized and that we have the capacity to be the hands and feet of God.

This journey of Advent provides us with a multiplicity of opportunities, as you will see in the pages of this newsletter, to both nurture our own souls and respond with compassion and generosity to those in need. It is my hope that during this Advent season that you will find some balance in your life. Times to nurture wonder and gratitude, thanksgiving and grace. And that you will embrace the opportunity to support another and accept the gifts of grace of those making the journey with you.

May the Advent Gifts of HOPE, PEACE, JOY and LOVE be yours this day and in the days ahead.

# **Transition Updates**

- Pacific Mountain Region surplus decision is still underway. We will keep you updated as we get word from the PMR what the decisions are related to their deliberations. We submitted additional information by Nov 13th as requested and are now awaiting further instructions and/or a decision.
- STORY Construction (our contractor) as well as a number of subcontractors will be finishing off numerous
  elements of the project throughout the month of December. Meetings about deficiencies and parts of the
  project that will continue into the new year are being held weekly.
- The moving in process has gone well and the unpacking is still underway. There are a still areas that will
  take time (especially items for longer term storage) to unpack and find the right spots for. The support of the
  various ministry teams and volunteers to make this happen has been tremendous.
- Library is still in process for both unpacking/sorting and figuring out the method for signing out books. In the meantime, feel free to simply borrow a book and then return it. There is no sign out system at the moment. We trust you.
- Things to happen in December:
  - Blinds installed
  - Keying , alarm and security systems completely engaged
  - Voicemail system engaged
  - Completion of audio-visual systems throughout the church
  - Programing of heating and HVAC system
  - Completion of Landscaping including benches
  - Completion of Signage
  - Door adjustments
  - Activation of EV chargers
- Things that will still be ongoing in 2024
  - Firelit window in back office
  - Railings for accessibility ramp in Sanctuary and side staircase
  - Renovation of 2 back offices
  - Replacement of Fire rated doors in select areas with Temp and fire rated doors
  - Installation of Indigenous Artwork
  - Selection and painting of Labyrinth design

She will be the friendly voice on the phone, the smiling face at the front desk and the one to answer your questions and queries about BVU and its space. 

Friday, Dec 1st, 7:30 pm: Play - The Birth of Light: A Queer Apocalyptic Nativity



Saturday Dec 2nd & Sunday Dec 3rd, 1 - 5 pm: Engaging Nativity Weekend: come and wander around the Commons and connecting rooms to enjoy an abundant and assorted array of Nativity scenes from around the world. Unique and diverse representations of the nativity story will invite us to ask, "who is missing in this story?" and "where do I fit in?". Hot chocolate, apple cider and Christmas cookies will be available and each day at 3pm there will be a 30-minute Christmas carol sing along as well.

<u>Sunday, Dec 10th, 3 pm: Let Love Rule - BVU Community Choir Concert.</u> Join us for an afternoon concert featuring music from around the world to fill your heart with peace and joy. Some 12 singalong seasonal favorites will be sprinkled through the concert and a special presentation from our new "Pringle Handbell Choir" will also be featured. Admission is by donation, and we promise you an afternoon of delightful music that will leave you feeling festive and fulfilled.

Sunday, Dec 10th, Two Letter Writings: Amnesty International "Write for Rights" and Letter Writing in solidarity with the WSÁNEĆ community to address the proposed highway development in Goldstream Park: There will be two stations where you can sit around the tables and write for justice in the Commons after each service. We want our government to uphold these Douglas Treaty rights, to sustain the wild salmon for future generations, and to protect the Goldstream River and this Class A Provincial Park. <u>Sunday, Dec 17th, 7 pm: Blue Christmas - A Service of Solace.</u> Christmas is not a joyful occasion for everyone. There are many reasons why this season can be difficult: loss of a loved one, broken relationships, loss of health, loneliness, painful memories, feeling overwhelmed by the preparations for and busyness of the season, expectations of others, seasonal affective disorder (SAD). The service features gentle readings and reflections, music and candle lighting, giving the opportunity to acknowledge and live into some of these feelings and make room for hope and new life to enter. Through the power of ritual, we will have the chance to grieve and let go, and enter gently into a

new place ready to experience Christmas anew. All are welcome to attend and you may wish to invite a friend or neighbor who you think might benefit from this experience.

Following the service there will be hot apple cider, Christmas treats and a time for meeting with others and sharing in conversation.

<u>Sunday</u>, <u>December 17th</u>, <u>Tacky yet festive Christmas Sweater Fun</u>. On the Third Sunday of Advent, you are invited if you wish, to join with others in some fun on "Joy" Sunday. We are encouraging folks to wear either a tacky Christmas sweater, or tacky Christmas bling or something bright and festive. Either way, our plan is to simply have some fun on this day. Of course, "Tacky" is a relative term in the eye of the beholder ... so just a small warning – Don't wear your favourite Christmas sweater that day, in case it's mistaken.

<u>Sunday, December 24th, 9 am Chapel and 11 am Sanctuary</u>. We will offer only two Sunday morning services as there will be 3 Christmas Eve services to follow in the afternoon and evening. Join us as we light all four of the advent candles of Hope, Peace, Joy and Loves as we prepare ourselves for the coming birth of Christ. 13

## Christmas Eve Services Dec 24th

On Dec 24th, will be offering 2 Advent 4 morning services and 3 different Christmas Eve Services to meet the variety of needs of our congregation and community. We invite you to attend any number of them as a way of connecting our faith story with your family's traditions

<u>9 am Chapel Service - Advent 4</u> - a gentle communion service to help us wrap up the advent season in a communal way.

<u>11 am Sanctuary Service Advent 4</u> - only one morning service for Advent this day due to all the other services in the afternoon and evening. This service will help wrap up the season of advent and prepare us to welcome the birth of the Christ Child.

<u>4 pm Family Celebration of the Nativity:</u> This service features an active way of retelling and entering into the Christmas story that will engage children of all ages. Carols and candles help the story touch our hearts and leave you ready to return to your home in time for supper.

**7pm Family Christmas Eve Candlelight Service**. This service is also geared to families of all configurations and will feature a drama that reminds us of the deeper meaning to the Christmas story. Lots of Carol singing and the lighting of candles whilst singing Silent Night bring a gentleness and magic ending to Christmas Eve

**9 pm Candlelight Communion Service**. A gentle service of reflection with a smooth jazz feel brings Christmas Eve celebrations to an end. Through singing, readings, reflections and the sharing of communion, this service seeks to deepen our understanding of the Christmas story and bring a sense of mystery into being.


## Children, Youth & Young Adults

One of the ways we work to make a practical impact for those living on the edges is to support the work of the Saanich Neighbourhood Place (SNP). After Christmas many young parents struggle with making ends meet and these supplemental items go a long way in supporting children and families at risk. SNP serves young parents between the ages of 13 and 28. Because most live on income assistance, they often don't have enough for necessities because their shelter allowance is low, therefore some of their support money must go to rent. That leaves most families very short of money for food and other essentials. Christmas and the weeks that follow become an added strain. You can help by bringing one of the following items:

diapers - sizes 4, 5 and 6 (little ones stay in the large sizes longer so therefore higher demand!), pull ups, infant formula, wipes, baby food, infant cereal, toilet paper, feminine hygiene products

These can also be dropped off during church office hours during the week. Bring these with you to the church anytime from Christmas day onward and place them in the designated spot in the Narthex. Thank you



#### Mt. Tolmie Shelter Update:

Good News!

Finally, the Mt. Tolmie Shelter residents and staff have moved to their long-awaited permanent housing this week. Until recently, for two years, Broad View United built support and connections with the residents and staff of Mt. Tolmie Shelter by sharing monthly BBQs and Conversations with Coffee. We shared many heart-warming moments with the residents and those who came to volunteer and share loving-kindness.

The new six-story building has been dubbed 'The Juniper,' and is located at 1176 Yates Street. It will offer 46 new studio units, each with its own private bathroom, shower, and kitchenette with a full fridge. Four units are accessible by wheelchair. The Juniper will be operated by PHS Community Services, who will provide supports through their 24/7 staff.

Since the Mt. Tolmie Shelter moved across the road from the CHX site (now, our newly renovated home) in December 2021, we have been attempting to be good neighbors. The volunteers provided basic Christmas bags for them, including socks, underwear, toques, scarves, and a Christmas card. This year, we will continue the gift-sharing as blessings to the residents and their new home.

#### **Introducing the Margaret Cameron Fund**

Christmas Gifts to our neighbours have been part of the Spiritual Care and Wellness Team at FMC. We have created gifts from the Margaret Cameron Fund to support our neighbours this fall. The includes \$2000 for Indigenous Education through Bridges for Women. A similar amount was sent to TAPS (Together Against Poverty) for vulnerable people living on the margins. Our support helped the Gender Generation Society with the costs of their camp and mural project. The North Park Hamper Project distributes hampers every Thursday. At Christmas, we donate Gingerbread kits for each family and add other goodies, in partnership with our Evolving Church team. We were blessed to be able to donate \$5,000 in November for the Projects for Women fundraising for the New Roads Recovery Centre of Our Place. This is not a comprehensive list, but we wanted to share a little of our history as we amalgamate. We are looking forward to working with Margaret Harper and the BVU team going forward.

I am opposed to any adverse impacts on the Goldstream River which supports wild chum, coho and chinook salmon. This would affect the ongoing practice of WSANEC rights including fishing, food gathering, ceremonial gatherings and exercising stewardship responsibilities. I support these Douglas Treaty rights and I want my government to uphold them.

The Ministry estimates that 600,000 people visit the Park annually, with peaks in the summer and the salmon spawning season. I want our future generations to be able to continue to learn about and to witness the salmon cycles that use the Goldstream River from cradle to grave.


A solution to the congestion and safety of the highway over the Malahat is to reduce traffic by implementing a regular and affordable bus service up island. A similar service to Sooke has reduced both traffic volume and improved safety. This can be implemented at a greatly reduced cost compared to the MOTI plan, protects the Goldstream River, the Class A Goldstream Provincial Park, respects WSANEC rights and can certainly be put in service before the next election in 2024.

Every day since October 7 we watch the news with broken hearts and tears of anguish imagining the suffering that the people of Israel/Palestine are experiencing. We know there are many Canadians who have family and friends living in the Holy Land and we want to find a way to show our support for all who are grieving and who long for peace.

As ordinary people, this is an opportunity to come together in our grief. It is not a protest. It is not a rally. It is a gentle walk. It is an opportunity to both support others in their grief and to receive support as we walk together with tenderness and respect for others, honouring all of humanity.

# Moderator's Letter, Advocating for a Ceasefire

On November 18, the General Council Executive, its corresponding members, and the members of the National Indigenous Council issued a plea to Prime Minister Trudeau to advocate for a ceasefire in the Israel-Hamas war, recognizing that, in the view of legal experts, genocide is currently taking place.

Dear Prime Minister,

This letter is to address the immediate and urgent need to stop genocide.

We have a long history of relationship with churches and partners in the region; for decades, we have joined our voices to theirs seeking an end to the illegal occupation of Palestine and the blockade of Gaza, and towards a just peace for all, upholding the rights of both Palestinians and Israelis to life and freedom.

We join in the international shock and outrage at the brutal attacks on Israeli communities by Hamas militants on October 7, 2023. We condemn the attacks on civilians, the killing of so many innocent children and people, as well as the taking of hostages and putting civilians in harm's way.

The people of The United Church of Canada are outraged by and condemn Israel's ongoing military action in Gaza, and the collective punishment of 2.2 million Gazans. We watch with horror and grief as more and more innocents in one of the world's most densely populated areas are being killed.

We condemn the attacks by Hamas as war crimes; we condemn the Israeli bombings of Gaza as a war crime. Canada has rightly and unequivocally condemned Hamas's actions. We call on Canada to unequivocally hold Israel to account for its legal obligations under international law as an occupying military power.

Israel's brutal bombardment of Gaza has resulted in the deaths of more than 11,000 Palestinians, including more than 4,500 children as of November 17. Thousands are trapped under the rubble. The shocking death toll rises with every hour. There is an unprecedented humanitarian crisis in Gaza because of the restriction of water, food, medical supplies, fuel, electricity, destruction of most of the medical facilities, the forced displacement of more than one million people, closure of all hospitals, and the complete collapse of the medical system.

This must end, now.

<u>Legal experts at the United Nations</u> have warned that the world is witnessing a genocide, and very little is being done to stop it. To the contrary, Canada, the United States, and other allies of the Israeli government have openly and repeatedly stated their unwavering support for Israel's actions. Fears over the safety of Palestinian civilians are growing as Israel suggests its bombardment of Gaza will shift to southern areas, having destroyed swaths of the north.

Meanwhile, the Israeli hostages remain in captivity in Gaza and their security is becoming more and more uncertain.

As is evident from the current tragedy, Canada's approach is not working nor is it conducive to a just peace. We urgently call upon your office to:

- recognize the genocide;
- uphold international human rights and humanitarian law without exception;
- call for an immediate ceasefire;
- advocate for the release of hostages;
- demand the opening of humanitarian corridors;
- and engage meaningfully in the pursuit of a just and lasting peace in the region.

The failure to clearly do so is unconscionable.

The people of The United Church of Canada have long raised our voices for just and lasting peace in the region. Since the intensification of conflict, we have issued statements, written letters, raised funds for humanitarian aid, and engaged in civil society and ecumenical actions—in deep concern for all lives in the land called "Holy."

We despair that, despite the cries of Canadians across the country, our government has failed to listen and to call for a ceasefire. We, the members of the Executive of the General Council and the National Indigenous Council of The United Church of Canada, add our voices to those cries.


We pray that you show moral courage and conviction and call for an immediate ceasefire in the interests of a just and lasting peace for both Palestinians and Israelis.
