Minister's Message

"Me encanta!"

Just a few days shy of Christmas Eve, when I told my friend that I had started to learn Spanish, she said, "Me encanta.", in Spanish, which means "I love it!". And that enchanted me. Me encanta! I could immediately see the linguistic connection between "encanta" and being enchanted!

Since then, I have learned and practiced Spanish using DuoLingo on my phone, every day. Finally, today, I got into the new grammar that explains Me encanta, and it fascinates and inspires me so much!

I understand that what fascinates me is purely based on how I interpret the grammar, but I hope there is some truth to my interpretation! Let me explain. "Me encanta" is literally translated in English to mean "I love it." When you say in English "I love it",



it's all about 'you' loving something. Whether or not the thing you love has any influence on you or relationship with you is not a consideration to the statement that you love it. If you like it, that's all there is to it. As long as *you* love it, if *your* will is to like it, that's all you need to say: you love it. In contrast, when you say, "Me encanta", you are saying that this thing has the power to make me love it. "I love it" because of the fact that I am enchanted. This one thing makes me receive its influence and recognize our relationship. This thing in the world, this person in the world, or this nature in the world enchants me; that's the reason I have come to love it. The grammar, in this particular exclamation "Me encanta", presumes the relationship I have with the thing in the world in the first place. It has the power to make me like it, love it and praise it. It's how I find myself, my emotion, my status, in dynamic relationship with all that exists in the world.

This new grammar enchants me to wonder what if, in the upcoming new season of Lent, we could open ourselves to "Me encanta", *to be enchanted*. To love.

Both Encanta and Enchant come from the same Latin origin, "Encantar", which also has a connection to singing and chanting. For example, love influences me like a song, just like the music flows into my body like the sound waves contained in chanting.

In this new season of Lent, we envision ourselves being enchanted ("to love") by the glowing love of God in the world — beautiful, sacred, and inviting us to hope, to sparkle, even while the world nudges us into polarization through conflict and a global epidemic of sadness. Traditionally, the season of Lent is a time to journey with somber courage, going deeper into life's shadows: following the stories of Jesus' 40-day retreat into the desert, grief, conflict, violence, death, the cross. Now, I invite you to ponder... What would it be like if we still looked for the glowing and growing love of God, sparkling much like glitter, even in the nighttime of our soul, and even, along with God, created more?

Love the sacred, glittering new hope in the world, because God's love enchants us in the first place, open ourselves up to the resurrection to love it, praise it, and live it.

The International Lenten Pancakes Supper is not only about the world of diverse pancakes to share, but also how we celebrate and acknowledge the beginning of our unique Christian journey with all communities and the cultures that we are and bring. It's all about faith, relationships, and honouring one another. Please come and enjoy pancakes from around the world, including Mexican Tortilla, Korean Kimchi pancakes, Japanese Okonomiyaki, crepes, latkes, regular and GF pancakes. Tickets go on sale on Sundays and during office hours: \$ 5 per person and \$ 15 per family (cash only.) After we enjoy our pancakes, we will go into the sanctuary for an Ashes ritual.

What is the Glitter+Ash ritual like?

On Ash Wednesday... WE WILL BE SEEN
Glitter is like love. It's irresistible and irrepressible.
Ashes are a statement that death and suffering are real.
Glitter is a sign of our hope, which does not despair.
Glitter signals our promise to repent, to show up, to witness, to work.
Glitter *never* gives up — and neither do we.

Ash Wednesday is a day when Christians receive the mark of the cross on their foreheads to begin 40 days of reflection and transformation in preparation for Easter. Glitter Ashes lets the world know that we are



progressive, queer-positive Christians. The public face of Christianity is often a face of intolerance — especially toward LGBTQia people. There are millions of Christians who believe that the Gospel commands us to love, not hate. Glitter ashes are a witness to an inclusive Christian message. Being enchanted by the glittering, glowing and growing love of God in the world, we show our faith in God who empowers us and wants us to repent of hurting each other. 
Transition Notes from Shelagh

BVU Library

The church library is open for borrowing books. The Library is a collection of three libraries, Cadboro Bay United, St. Aidan's United and First Met Unted. The three churches used different methods for signing out books; cards, and two different computer systems. There were also three methods of labeling the spines to identify the books so it has been difficult to combine the collections easily. However, for the present time, the books may be borrowed on the honour system whereby the person borrowing the book takes it out and returns it to the place they took it from when they have finished reading it.



The Library has been arranged in the following sections;

the first section (nearest the kitchen in the Commons room) has 4 divided shelving units. The first set contains information about the Bible. The next set contains books about Theology and Spirituality. The third set contains books about the United Church, Prayer and Meditation, Worship and Devotion, and also other religions. The fourth set contains books about Ageing, Family Relationships, Personal Relationships, Gender Identity, and Healing. Along the bottom shelves of this section are the Children's Picture Books. The second section is located between the First section and the fireplace and has two sets of shelving units. The first set contains Fiction books and the second set has Biographies. Finally, the third section also has 2 sets of shelves. The first set contains books on Social Issues and First Nations Issues. The second set contains books on Personal Growth and books for Youth and early chapter books.

All the books in all the sections have been alphabetized by author (most have the first three letters of the author on the spine label) so please try to return books in the correct place. There is no Librarian at the present time to reshelve the books for you so do your best to return them to the right place. We have many boxes of books for the Library that will not fit on the shelves. For now they are being stored until a decision is made on how to use them. Thank you for your co-operation. 


Beloved and Belong: Baptism and membership course

What can ordinary people do in the face of climate chaos? Throw up their hands in despair and give up? keep calm and carry on with business as usual because it doesn't matter anyways? As Christians, we look to our stories and the life of Jesus for inspiration and guidance. We know we have a duty of care for Creation- all creation, not just the human ones. But sadly we haven't accepted our responsibilities, so here we are today. Healing our relationships with Earth and with all who call Earth home, has to be our priority, but what does that look like?

DYK? Four levels of action for change

LEVEL 1: Individual

(buy less, drive less, eat less meat, recycle more, plant a garden, reduce air travel)

LEVEL 2: with family and friends

(Get family and friends to do the same, install solar panels/heat pumps, support local growers, help restore wetlands, cut your family's plastic use in half)

LEVEL 3: with community, workplaces and local institutions

(Change the way your school or church deals with food waste, get workplace to have a bike lock-up, encourage more tree planting on private and public lands, meet the mayor to talk about car-free days)

LEVEL 4: through the economy and policy change

(Write politicians, sign petitions, participate in marches, rallies, & push for systemic change) More about action next month. Here are 2 questions for you now:

Topics include: How does the weather influence culture? The implications of the question, "Where are you from?" and cultural views of aging? The gift of our conversation circle is the openness and willingness to learn from each other. There is no expert in the room, as everyone has something to share.



Saturday Social: every Saturday 6:30 - 8:30 PM

Our Saturday Social offers a wonderful opportunity to connect with people across diverse cultures! The group is increasingly intercultural AND intergenerational, with some families attending as three generations. The 30-40 participants represent 7-10 different countries and languages! Various activities, including ping pong, games,



karaoke, dance, and conversations over tea or international snacks, happen simultaneously.

As the group continues to grow, I want to clarify the intention of our Saturday Social. We aim to create a safe space for intercultural folks – those who have just arrived in Canada within the last 5 years or so, or whose community has been traditionally marginalized in our society. Members of the dominant culture in Canada are welcome to join in this effort, focusing on creating a welcoming space for the intercultural group.

Volunteers are most welcome for setting up table tennis tables, helping in the kitchen, welcoming, and engaging as conversation partners. Please let me know if you're interested in being part of this transformative ministry.

welcome everyone to join the Weeks of Connection and A Feast of Friendship.


- Weeks of Connection: On weeks without sessions, participants are encouraged to pair up with volunteers from the congregation for home-cooked meals, deepening friendships.


