Discerning some pathways forward - Mark Green

We will need to be both flexible and curious to listen deeply to the values that each person expresses as they share their hopes, dreams and past experiences.

I am excited to see what you each bring to the table. I'm curious to hear how you will want to build on what we have done to date and what priorities you will name for the coming years. This process doesn't begin and end with the time we spend under Allison's leadership. There was much that has brought us to this point in time and work that we will continue to do after the Visioning process wraps up in May. There will be things for the Board to refine, projects for Teams to take hold of, new Teams and small groups to emerge and new initiatives to find staff and volunteers to manage. It will be an exciting time.

I hope you will each find a way to engage in the process in some way, shape or form ...even if its simply to offer prayers for those who are meeting to discern. Blessings to you one and all.

2024 BVU AGM

The BVU Board has chosen Sunday April 21st as our AGM date. The meeting will be at 2pm and will be a virtual meeting. The annual report along with yearend financials for both BVU and First Met will be distributed approx. 2 weeks in advance of the meeting. A link will be sent around as well several times in advance of the meeting for folks to connect either by computer zoom or on their phone.

Building Renovation Update

Finishing up of a number of delinquencies continues as we seek to close off the project. The following are underway or completed.

Completed: Hooks in bathrooms, fire window in Admin office area, new flooring and painting in auxiliary admin offices, plugs in Narthex kitchen, adjustments to HVac systems, office millwork, additional alarm system panels and configuration, additional handrails for chancel, adjustments to auto doors.

In Process: Millwork in photocopy room, millwork in chapel, lighting/baseboard in auxiliary admin area, keying of building, chancel stair demarcation, crestor lighting controls for sanctuary, larger dishwashing sink in commons kitchen, repair to ceiling cracks that have emerged in admin entry, narthex and sanctuary, first aid/AED stations mounted, white boards installed, EV chargers activated, outdoor plug by shed, repair to admin reception desk, compost/garbage custom bins for kitchen, planter custom liners, exterior rainbow stairs off chancel doors

Volunteers Needed

BVU is a busy place. There is always a need for volunteers in a variety of areas. Each month we post opportunities to be involved. Contact Janiena at the reception desk to have your name added to the list of those interested in any of the opportunities below.

Easter Sunrise Breakfast: We are looking for 5 people who can help us prepare a simple breakfast of hardboiled eggs, hot oatmeal (+toppings), hot cross buns and fruit. This hospitality will be offered to those who have attended the Sunrise service. Let the office know if you can help with this.

Gardening: those interested in helping to weed and maintain the garden beds around the labyrinth and front of the church. Your involvement could be a few hours per week or month. A schedule will be created for those interested and additional hours needed will be contracted out. Grass cutting will be a contracted item.

Hospitality: We are pulling together our hospitality team of those interested in both oversight of hospitality as well as some occasional coordination of our hospitality ministry. This is an important behind the scenes involvement to ensure that all those coming to BVU feel welcome and attended to.

Sanctuary Candle Maintenance: We need 1 or 2 people to make sure that the candles on the sides of the church are refilled and maintained each week.

Staff Happenings

Sabbatical: It is the policy in the United Church that Order of Ministry persons will earn 3-month sabbatical every 5 years in ministry in the same place. Shelagh MacKinnon has been putting off her well-earned sabbatical time until the amalgamation process was completed. She will be away on Sabbatical April 8th to July 8th. During that time Shelagh will be exploring two themes: 1) Best practices regarding post amalgamation pastoral care and transition and 2) Retirement: best practices for self and congregation. More about this will be in the April newsletter but we wanted to give you a heads up now. We wish her renewal and insight during this sabbatical time.

Booking Space at BVU

If your small group, ministry team or any other BVU activity is looking to be in the church building, it will be important to phone or email Janiena at the reception desk to book a time and space. We will be opening up the building to external renters beginning in March. BVU groups and activities have priority but to avoid overbooking the spaces we need to know who is interested when. Ongoing groups are already booked into the calendar and those groups don't need to contact the front desk.

Also, if your group is scheduled to be in outside of normal church opening hours, you will need to obtain a door code and alarm code along with instructions for access.

International Pancake Supper

What an amazing night was had a Broad View this year as we celebrated the beginning of Lent through an intercultural lens. Over 175 people shared in international pancake dinner, good conversations and the followed with a glitter Ash Wed service. Pancakes traditions included Japan, Korea, France, Mexico, as well as traditional Canadian pancakes and Latkes. Two delicious gluten free and vegan options were also offered.

Coldest Night of the Year 2024

On Saturday, February 24, about a dozen people from Broad View United participated in the Coldest Night of the Year walkathon in the downtown area to raise funds for Our Place Society. Others from the BVU team had chosen to walk on their own paths in Saanich earlier in February. Thanks to our generous donors, including pledges, the BVU team raised \$9,685.85, almost 97% of our \$10,000 goal. There is not too late to donate through cnoy.org, search for and donate to the "Broad View United" team.

The Coldest Night of the Year is a national event. It total, there were 40,399 walkers at 190 locations that raised \$13,470,085 for local charities that support the unhoused. There were two walks in Victoria. The BVU team was one of 70 teams for the walk that started and ended at Our Place on Pandora and that collectively raised \$122,402. Broad View United was second among Victoria



teams in total funds raised. The other Victoria area walk was in the Westshore (Langford), and it raised \$57,580.

A huge thank you to all our donors and walkers!

Refugee Sponsorship Update

At long last, the Refugee project that First Met began several years ago is coming to fruition. Two or three years ago, we gave \$30,000 to ICA in trust to pay for the first year's sponsorship of a refugee to Canada. We donated the money, and a group headed by Robin Stevenson is looking after the practical aspects of the sponsorship. She found a refugee through the Rainbow Coalition. He is a medical professional in his thirties from Afghanistan, now living in Pakistan. He has finally received official acceptance to come to Canada and should be here in the spring or summer of this year.

At this point Robin's group is looking for an affordable (\$1500 a month, including utilities) one-bedroom suite. I know that is a big ask in Victoria's housing market, but perhaps you, or someone you know, might have something suitable. If you do know of any possibilities, please contact Edeana Malcolm, 250-412-7682 and she will pass that information to Robin. She will keep you informed of any future needs of this refugee, like furniture, etc.

Honouring Lois Wilson: A lifetime dedicated to the common good

At 96 years of age, Lois Wilson has devoted virtually all of her lifetime to her community.

She's a United Church minister, a community organizer, the first female moderator of the United Church of Canada, a president of the World Council of Churches, a staunch human rights advocate who visited South Africa, South Korea, and Argentina — all in one year, and a former independent member of the Senate of Canada who found common cause with both left and right. Lois Wilson is an inspiration to everyone she meets. The book, For the Sake of the Common Good: Essays in Honour of Lois Wilson, is written by people who have worked with her.

CBC Radio hosts an excellent series called: **IDEAS**, which has been aired for several decades. Recently they hosted one on Lois. Lois has been a good friend to many, including First Met, as both she and Allan Saunders were in Ministry in Winnipeg for many years. Maundy Thursday







He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?"

Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand.

Unless I wash you, you have no share with me." (John 13)

Join us on **Maundy Thursday**, **March 28**th, **at 6 pm**, for honoring the traditions with the local Sikh faith community, Gurudwara in Victoria, BC — the seder meal and the Langar (Punjabi: ਲੰਗਰ, pronunciation: [lʌŋgər], 'kitchen'). Guru Nanak, the first Sikh guru, started the tradition of 'Langar' of sharing and caring. It is a process where Sikhs share their honest earnings to provide food and care for everyone — it was designed to uphold the principle of equality between all people regardless of religion, caste, color, creed, age, gender, or social status. In addition to the ideals of equality, the tradition of Langar expresses the ethics of sharing, community, inclusiveness, and the oneness of all humankind... The light of God is in all hearts.

In the Christian tradition, Maundy Thursday is a day "defined by love," grounding our faith in the story of the Last Supper. Maundy, derived from the Latin word *mandatum*, means "mandate" or "commandment." During the Last Supper, Jesus washed the disciples' feet and gave a new commandment to love one another, just as Christ loves us. *Each table and the floor where we eat together will be the communion table… the place of the Last Supper.*

This year, the Sikh members will share their culture and generosity with their traditional foods. Broad View United will receive, welcome, and honor the generosity of the Sikh community, honoring intercultural relationships and spiritual traditions. Following the meal, we will participate in a simple handwashing ritual and engage in intercultural conversation.


Please RSVP and register <u>HERE</u>. Admissions are by donations. Last year, the BVU Community was recipient to the generosity within the Palestinian culture through food and the presence of two friends, both named Amal. One identified as being from Gaza. The situation for her nuclear family in Gaza is heart-breaking. Four siblings and their families had to flee to Rafah (25 in total). Two young nephews have serious health issues requiring medical assistance. In December her parents were sent to hospitals in Spain. Their visas have expired. All donations will contribute to helping with their complex needs.

Good Friday: Reimagining the Stations of the Cross

The Stations of the Cross is an historic pilgrimage through the routes of Jesus' final hours. We have imagined a de-constructed and re-imagined Stations of the Cross. We will gather in the Sanctuary and use the full areas of the church and the Labyrinth site to physically be engaged in the ways Good Friday is happening today. Building on the pattern of Jesus' last day, parallels for 2024 include Nature, those betrayed & arrested today and the crucified people of history. We will end with a Silent Communion. 

Hospitality includes equipment set-up (tables, chairs, toys), take-down and sanitizing, as well as snack and



beverage prep and clean up. You'd start by 9am and be done around noon. This group is adorable and a lot of fun!
