Letting the Light In

"Ring the bells that still can ring, forget your perfect offering There is a crack, a crack in everything, that's how the light gets in" - Leonard Cohen, Anthem

As we begin a new year and look back at the year behind us, there is much that happened for each of us that we could not have predicted. The only thing for certain we can say is that what lies ahead for us in 2025 is mostly unknown. While there are trends and there are things that happen for us each year, there is still much that happens in a year that we cannot control or predict. All we can do is navigate it to the best of our ability and with as much grace as possible.

When we think about the year ahead, we have a few choices: trepidation, anticipation, dread and curiosity. While these four choices are not exhaustive, they do represent a range of possibilities. What tends to happen for us in today's binary world is we are often asked to believe that we have to choose which of these perspectives we might have rather than realizing that they are not mutually exclusive and it is possible to hold all these perspectives in tension and embrace each of them in some way. In fact, I'd like to suggest that doing so is probably the healthiest place we can be emotionally and spiritually.

To not have some trepidation or dread would be naive, but to have no anticipation or curiosity would severely limit one's capacity to be open to both the little and big joys that do happen for each of us. If we set the expectation that there is nothing for us to look forward to or that 2025 will end with us feeling disappointed, then we are missing the opportunity to see the many, many instances of the Spirit breaking in on our world.

Perhaps that's why Epiphany is at the start of our Christian year: A reminder that the light shines in and around us, in spite of the cursing and violence. The story of the star and the Magi, reminds us that while the context of the world around us may be filled with human misery and the attempt to flee from danger, that the inbreaking of light and hope and possibility are also present. And that the presence of God does not leave us or abandon us but rather travels with us, accompanies us and shines a light on the pathway forward.

So, let us go into 2025 with this same reminder. In spite of the very difficult and tragic events of the world around us, we continue to look for ways to amplify the light that does shine. Through our own actions and the recognition of the actions of others, we will find our way through the darkness. We will open ourselves to moments of joy and surprise. And we will with curiosity, look for what new things have been birthed anew.



VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITY: WORSHIP CANDLE STATIONS

EXTREME WEATHER EMERGENCY SHELTER

Broad View United and the City of Saanich are working together to put in place a plan for BVU to provide emergency shelter for those who are unhoused or living on the margins during extreme weather events. We anticipate that there won't be more than 5 or so days of such a need. Saanich will provide the Sleeping Mats, and some personnel trained in Mental Health support for supervision during the night. BVU will provide the hospitality and the space.



We are currently pulling together a small team of those who might be able to offer support should there be an extreme weather event. We will be looking for volunteers willing to supply cookies and muffins, preparing a hot breakfast and offering a friendly face or ear for a 4-hour shift. If you can help in any of the areas named above, please go to **Jotform** and indicate where you are open to volunteers as the need arises. Training and orientation will be provided as well.

HEARING SYSTEM IN SANCTUARY AT BVU

When we did the renovation of the sanctuary, we did install a loop antenna in the floor and an amplifier in the pedestal rack at the booth. It covers the main area of the main church except close to the platform where acoustic energy usually fills in and the main speakers are loudest.

For hearing aid identification, any hearing aid with **T-coil reception** will automatically work with this system and the hearing aid is set to T-coil. We also have two body pack loop receivers for someone who doesn't have T-coil reception or is simply hard of hearing with no hearing aids. If you inquire at the sound both they can provide you with the body pack. We are eager to hear how this system is working for folks and your feedback would be appreciated as we make ongoing adjustments to enable everyone access to the sound in the best ways we can.







BIBLE STUDY INVITATION









CARING FOR CREATION

A growing number of local governments around the world recognize that it's unfair for our communities to bear the rising costs of mitigating and adapting to climate change alone. In fact, over 40 US cities and states have launched climate change lawsuits against fossil fuel companies, and 28 Canadian law professors have said that we can do the same here in BC. By working with other BC local governments on a class action lawsuit, we can keep the costs manageable and avoid risks, while protecting citizens from having to pay 100% of the growing costs of climate change. It's just good economics.


