Lately, I've been watching the Korean drama *When Life Gives You Tangerines* on Netflix. In the opening scene, we see the elderly woman who becomes the main character participating in an outdoor poetry class at a senior home. There are pencils, sketch paper, and crayons. She picks up a blue crayon and slowly fills the entire page with blue.

As a child, she loved poetry. But in that moment, she says nothing—just colours the page blue with a worn-down crayon. The sea of Jeju Island where she was born, the sky above her in that present moment—they blend into one silent memory of her mother.

This April, Lent comes late. And like the pace of spring this year, it invites us into a slower, deeper Lenten journey. The ground is still damp, the blossoms are just beginning, and we are slowly beginning to imagine the warmer seasons ahead.

But even as spring awakens, it's hard to start the day without concern. The rise of authoritarian regimes around the world weighs heavily on our hearts. Even Canada is not untouched. In Gaza, the ceasefire has been broken. Around the world, the sovereignty of people—and of nature itself—is under threat. Our struggles are deeply interconnected.

April is also Poetry Month. Research shows that writing about emotional themes can reduce stress, anxiety, and depression. Reading and writing poetry can be a powerful form of healing. Poetry helps us reach into the depths of our hearts and give words to what we feel.

When speaking to others, it can be hard to find the right words. But in stillness, with a pen in hand, we can let our emotions flow—our grief, joy, gratitude, or hope.

Audre Lorde wrote, **“Poetry is not a luxury. It is a vital necessity of our existence. It gives form to the quality of light within us... first made into language, then idea, then more tangible action.”** Poetry gives a name to the nameless—so we can begin to think and act.

This Lent, try connecting with your own poetic voice. The Psalms in the Bible are full of poetic cries—“Hear me, O God. Hear my supplication.”

As we enter Holy Week—Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Sacred Saturday, and Easter—listen for the voice within you. Learn from Jesus's agony and resurrection. And give your emotions a name, just as a poet names the nameless—so that your hope, too, might rise.

MAUNDY THURSDAY | APRIL 17 | 7:00–8:30 PM

An evening of Open Mic, Spiritual Practice, and Decolonizing Communion

This year, it can feel almost impossible to start the day without concerns. The rise of authoritarian regimes around the world continues to weigh heavily on our spirits. In Gaza, the ceasefire has been broken. The ongoing erosion or threats to the sovereignty of nations—and of nature itself—remind us how deeply interconnected our struggles are.



On Maundy Thursday, the night we remember Jesus's Last Supper, we will gather for an Open Mic to share our emotions and longings during this Lenten season.

Poetry helps us express what rational language often cannot.

But it doesn't have to be poetry—short writing, music, or artwork (within 3 minutes) are all welcome.

The evening will include:

- **Open Mic** (poetry, short writing, music, or any offering that helps express your emotions, *within 3 minutes*)
- **Spiritual Practice**, including Foot/Hand Washing and Healing Pathway
- ending with **Decolonizing Communion**, where we'll share bread (including GF), olive oil, and Zaatar, grounded in the words and spirit of Jesus's last meal.

No registration is required. Come as you are.

GOOD FRIDAY STATION OF THE CROSS | APRIL 18 | 10:30 AM

This Lenten journey reimagines the Stations of the Cross through various artistic interpretations, addressing contemporary issues like ecological crises while focusing on personal spiritual growth. Expanding from last year's four stations to include more, it aims to connect historic spiritual resources with today's challenges. The service



emphasizes local imagery and the impacts of climate disaster, war, and loss on all life forms. Interactive elements will be included, culminating in a silent Communion service where participants are encouraged to engage as they feel led. This reflective service is open to everyone.

GOOD FRIDAY JAZZ VESPER | APRIL 18 | 7 PM

A Good Friday experience grounded in music that helps us end Holy Week both lamenting the state of the world and the ongoing experiences of crucifixion and transitioning us to hope for Resurrection as Easter Sunday approaches. The 1-hour service will feature music that will feed our souls to both sing with and listen to. It features Louise Rose, Cheryl Dennett, and other special musical guests and is led by Mark Green.



EASTER SUNRISE SERVICE

Join us outdoors at Mount Tolmie Park on Mayfair Dr at 7: 00 a.m. for a Resurrection Celebration! Leadership will be provided by **Rev. Shelagh MacKinnon** and music by **Jeff Poynter**. When you get to Mount Tolmie, look for us! This service is about 30 minutes long. There are always several congregations who gather.

After the service, we are welcomed back at Broad View Commons, where breakfast will be ready for us, courtesy of Rev Mark Green and some caring volunteers! It is a beautiful way to rejoice as a community.

WORSHIP IN THE STYLE OF TAIZÉ

Broad View church will be hosting the monthly Prayer and Music in the Style of Taize this spring: **Fridays at 6 pm, April 25, May 16 and June 20th**. This is a great opportunity to check out Taize style prayer services and what the appeal has been for young and old alike for over 7 decades.

In Victoria there has been an ecumenical group of people who for 30+ years welcomed and supported Taizé style services in their churches as part of a 3-month rotation before it moves on to another church community. Broad View welcomes all those who would like to experience the Taizé services while they are at our church. The service lasts about 1 hour with lingering time before and after at your leisure.

A Taizé style service has an unhurried, peaceful pace. Candles and periods of silence create a meditative space, and repetitious chant-like songs offer one the opportunity to calm and centre our souls.

The prayer and music in the style of Taizé has spread enthusiastically around the globe from its centre in France. Each year, tens of thousands of pilgrims of all ages are welcomed at the Taizé community in France, from Europe and other continents. For more history and context visit www.taize.fr. AGM UPDATE - MAY 4TH, 2025

A LEGACY OF SHARING

What a celebration this is!! This amazing Legacy gift was made possible by the faithful stewardship of the First-Metropolitan U.C. Foundation. It was a joyful service as Broads View United its strong historic and continuing support of Our Place Society. Watch our website for more details, including the video that was created for this occasion. This gift is helping to fund three transformative projects, each offering hope, security, stability, and safety for women at different stages of their recovery journey.



First, the Women's Therapeutic Recovery Community (WTRC); will be the first long-term therapeutic recovery community for women on Vancouver Island. With Broad View's support, a Healing Garden will be created as a sanctuary of safety and renewal. In a life marked by addiction's unpredictability and danger, the garden will offer space for yoga, meditation, cultural activities, and moments of connection with children, symbolizing peace, healing, and hope.

Second, for women graduating from the recovery program without children, new second stage housing will provide a safe, stable, and sober environment with light support. This housing will help women transition into independent living while managing mental and physical health needs and maintaining sobriety.

Finally, the Family Reunification House will offer a supportive home where women who have completed WTRC can reconnect and live with their children. This safe, nurturing space will allow families to rebuild their lives and lay a foundation for a brighter future.

SUNDAY MORNING ADULT SUNDAY SCHOOL

Sunday mornings April and May, 9:30- 10:30

Beginning in April, we will gather any adults who wish to dig in deeply into the Gospel of Mark. Our time together will probe some of the history, background and nuances of the First Gospel written that is contain within the bible. The rest of the gospels are based around this book and yet Mark's style and theological perspective is a unique one that gets changed by Matthew and Luke in their revisions. Leadership will be provided by Mark and Shelagh. While attendance for the whole 8 weeks is recommended, we know that folks may need to come and go and therefore each session will stand on its own. How far through the Gospel we get will depend on the group... we will go at the pace the group is ready to move through the narrative. If one reads the whole Gospel of Mark in advance, this would be a good thing but not required (it's the shortest gospel)

WORLD DAY OF PRAYER SERVICE SUCCESS

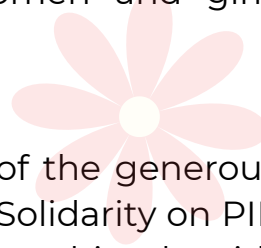

Queer Spiritual Collective Retreat

Queer Spiritual Collective Retreat: *Centered on Belonging, Calm, and Connection*

At a time when 2SLGBTQ+ communities—especially trans individuals—are under duress and increasingly marginalized, we are coming together to offer care and solidarity.

What spiritual resources of resilience are needed in these times? How can we offer one another a space and place where we feel and know we belong? How can we calm our agitated nervous systems?

A collective of faith community leaders—including **Broad View United** (Ha Na Park), **Lutheran Church of the Cross** (Lyndon Sayers), **Unitarian Universalist Community of Victoria** (Shana Lynngood), Gagan Leekha, and others—have come together with open hearts to dream up a half-day, ecumenical and interfaith retreat. This gathering is for 2SLGBTQIA+ people of faith, offering space for calm, belonging, and connection in these challenging times.



We envisioned an intergenerational retreat that welcomes all 2SLGBTQ+ individuals seeking solidarity and belonging beyond denominational lines. We hope this retreat will deepen networks of care and support, and strengthen our collective resilience as we stand with and for 2SLGBTQ+ individuals and communities—within and beyond our faith traditions.

Lunch, snacks and fruits will be provided. Donations are gratefully received, but not required. Students attend for free—give what you can, if you can, and please come regardless!

- Support the declaration of pronouns.
- Experiment from a place of respect.
- Feel free to ask for clarification.

DON'Ts

- Declare them as "male pronouns" or "female pronouns".
- Cast off a pronoun round as unimportant.
- Think of them as "preferred pronouns".
- Readily assume a person's pronouns.

ASK

You can't tell someone's name or pronoun just by looking at them. Asking them is showing your respect.

RESPECT

If someone needs time to share their name and pronoun, please respect and make them feel comfortable. It's not up to you to decide others' identity.

PRACTICE

Practice makes perfect. If you are unsure about how to use pronouns appropriately ask others to point out your mistakes.

As we face today’s interconnected crises of debt and climate injustice, let us act boldly to restore human welfare and ecological balance.

- **More than 54 countries in the Global South allocate over 10 percent of their revenues to net interest payments, diverting resources from essential development and climate action.**
- **In 48 countries representing 3.3 billion people, governments spend more on debt payments than on healthcare or education.**
- **In some cases, public debt levels have grown so large that repayment is no longer feasible, creating an unsustainable burden for future generations.**
- **This economic injustice is compounded by “ecological debt,” as countries in the Global North exploit resources from the Global South and Indigenous communities, often causing significant environmental and human rights harm.**
